As the music teacher at Boone Meadow Elementary, I am continually seeking out ways to encourage discovery, wonder, beauty and creativity in the lives of my students. Recently I've been inspired by transparent pianos, like the Edelweiss Klavier upright piano that Mark Rober used in his Rush E YouTube video linking science, engineering, art and music. The Edelweiss Klavier is a transparent piano, built out of clear acrylic rather than wood, that clearly shows all the mechanisms, hammers, dampers, strings, and levers that make a piano work. Seeing what is usually hidden through the transparent instrument brings a beauty that is truly captivating, and I would absolutely love to bring one to my school and share it with my students.

UNFORTUNATELY after looking it up I discovered that the Edelweiss Klavier costs \$60,000...

Undeterred, I began brainstorming other options, and I had the idea to retrofit the upright piano we already have with four custom cut transparent panels. The piano's lid, upper panel, key cover, and lower panel could all be replaced with clear acrylic and have no effect on the structure or playability of the piano itself. Those pieces would offer a window into the inside of the piano, and by adding LED lighting we could turn an otherwise standard piano into a visually striking educational tool, an instrument that fosters curiosity at its highest level through interactive learning.

Boone Meadow is a place where students are encouraged to share their learning, and we invite students who take piano lessons to play for their peers during morning arrival. This practice fills our halls with music, and it builds so much confidence in our young performers. I can only imagine their excitement if one day our piano were transparent, and I truly believe that the instrument would become unforgettable part of their elementary education.
